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
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

Dr. Elsbeth Kalenderian's First Year as Dean of **Marquette School of Dentistry**

Communication and collaboration

One of Kalenderian's primary goals was to improve transparency and foster open communication across the school and alumni base. These efforts included breakfast sessions with faculty and students, regular town hall meetings and travel to meet dentists across Wisconsin - and the rest of the country.

"I try to be very approachable, and my door is always open," she explains. "I wanted my first year as dean to be about connections and opportunity. I've learned a great deal from our faculty, students, staff and alumni, and I look forward to expanding those relationships."

In addition, she has continued to strengthen ties with state officials who support the dental school's mission. Along with other Wisconsin healthcare leaders, Kalenderian was appointed to the Governor's Task Force on the Healthcare Workforce to study workforce challenges, explore ways to improve patient care and retention, and create a plan for sustainable healthcare workforce development and innovation.

Among other highlights, Kalenderian hosted state officials to recognize MUSoD's May 2024 graduates as the first in the country to offer a diploma privilege program, which speeds up the licensing process for new graduates who plan to practice in Wisconsin. She has also emphasized

a strengthened relationship with the Wisconsin Dental Association, a leading organization in state dental policy that includes many Marquette alumni as members.

"Dean Kalenderian is a true partner and is committed to working with organized dentistry in Wisconsin," says Tom Reid, DDS '99, WDA president. "She understands the importance of the School of Dentistry as the convenor on oral healthcare policy, such as hosting the Dental Examining Board and the Governor's Task Force on the Healthcare Workforce meetings at the dental school for the first time, and celebrating the first-ever class to receive diploma privilege in dental education. These initiatives exemplify the dental school's commitment to statewide organized dentistry, and I am excited for the WDA's partnership with the school to continue to grow."

A major highlight was securing a \$5 million state grant to address a gap in oral health expertise in Wisconsin. Since the closure of the state's last General Practice Residency (GPR) program in 2015, there has been a pressing need to train dentists capable of treating medically complex patients.

"Not having a GPR program created a huge gap of expertise in the state for oral health specialists," she says. "Establishing this program means we can be at the center of addressing a very real issue in our state."

Pending Commission on Dental Accreditation approval, the grant from the state Department of Health Services will create a new GPR program at MUSoD and with a regional hospital partner is expected to be operational by the end of 2025.

xpanding educational opportunities and research

Kalenderian is making headway in expanding externship sites in rural areas, which allows students to practice outside the classroom clinical setting and simultaneously address needs in areas where healthcare is scarce. She is leading the effort to create a new Director of Externships position to help the school expand its program, with a goal to establish up to 10 new sites in a variety of clinical settings with calibrated dental preceptors in the next year.

She established the Department of Community Dental Sciences, which underscores the school's mission to serve patient populations that don't have access to regular dental care.

"We want to reinforce the message that we're a community-focused dental school," she says. "I think that's truly important as the only dental school in Wisconsin."

She also worked to strengthen this newly developed, state-supported rural dental scholarship program, which aims to increase dental access, particularly in rural communities, while incentivizing dentists to practice in rural Wisconsin. The annual scholarships provide \$30,000 to a student who practices in an area with a dentist shortage for 18 months. The scholarships are awarded to up to 15 MUSoD students each year.

"This has been a terrific development," says Dean Kalenderian. "We've worked very hard to build a more permanent infrastructure for the school and our programs, while expanding efforts to engage with the community, which has been incredibly successful for the school."

On the research front, the school has received several large National Institutes of Health (NIH) grants. Additionally, Kalenderian has hired new faculty members focused on clinical research, further enhancing the school's scientific contributions and academic offerings. "It's super exciting to see where we can go with that research, and I know we'll steadily expand our research strengths," she says. (Read more about MUSoD's research grants on page 10.)

Strategic initiatives for growth and innovation

Over the past year, Kalenderian and her leadership team prioritized working with the university to align their strategic plans in conjunction with a revenue enhancement plan that will ensure the financial stability of the dental school and university. "Being able to get our strategic plan drafted quickly in sync with the university was a huge accomplishment," she explains. "Our strategic plan focuses on helping students thrive, creating a healthy campus environment and caring for the world. It's a robust plan that sets us up as active participants of the university's 'Securing Our Future' efforts."

Her vision for the school's future additionally includes updating teaching methods by including active learning and new technology approaches. She's committed to ensuring that the school's physical infrastructure supports these advancements. In recent years, the school has renovated several clinics – including the Pediatrics clinic and the new Delta Dental Urgent and Special Care Clinic this year – in addition to the state-of-the-art Innovation Center; the dean has plans for future improvements in other areas.

"A thriving campus looks at your buildings and classrooms to ensure they're equipped to deliver a modern pedagogy," she explains. "To be at the forefront of dental education, our students and faculty require an investment that allows them to grow as the profession grows. An emphasis on matters such as artificial intelligence and special needs care keep us on this path of progress."

Dr. Kimo Ah Yun, acting president, provost and executive vice president for academic affairs, said he's impressed with Dean Kalenderian's progress over the last year.

"As a campus leader, Dean Kalenderian's innovative approach to dental education has been invaluable to the efforts of both the university and School of Dentistry's strategic plans that are aligned with our mission in service to others," he says. "Dean Kalenderian is a highly sought-after expert, ranging from her appointment to the Governor's Task Force on the Healthcare Workforce to continuing to expand her research portfolio on patient safety and quality improvement in a dental setting. I thoroughly enjoy working with Dean Kalenderian and look forward to seeing the Marquette School of Dentistry continue to thrive under her leadership."

Making mental health and wellness a top priority

Student mental health was another critical focus during Kalenderian's first year. Recognizing the unique challenges students face, particularly their demanding clinic schedules, she established a mental health task force in December of 2023. The task force quickly developed a comprehensive plan to support students' well-being. The school has already implemented several initial measures, and Kalenderian and the student affairs staff are working to hire a mental health and wellness counselor who will help students navigate the available mental health resources.

"It was made clear that we need a mental health counselor in place to help put that entire plan into action," she says. "We're listening to students and doing as much as we can for them. We always want to do more, and I know we will get there together."





Kalenderian recognizes the hurdles and stigmas that still exist in discussions about mental health, but working with other campus leaders and resource officers has made the process more fluid.

"I appreciate how incredibly kind the Marguette community is," she emphasizes. "We have a strong, mission-driven organization, and it's a good place to work. People truly have each other's backs."

Strengthening alumni relationships

Kalenderian deeply values alumni engagement and views Marquette School of Dentistry graduates as critical to shaping the future of the school and its students. "I so appreciate our alums," she exclaims. "They're invaluable to the history, the present and the future of our school."

She sees alumni as vital contributors not only through financial support but also through externship programs and mentorship opportunities, which offer valuable life and professional student guidance. "Alumni are the guiding light to show our students the impact they can make in our profession," she savs.

She invites alumni to visit the school and experience how MUSoD has innovated since their times as students. "It's a different day and a different school," she says. "We'd love alumni to see how the school has grown, how education has grown and how we're moving forward."

As Dean Kalenderian looks to the future, she's confident that the Marquette School of Dentistry is well-positioned to thrive. "We're setting the foundation for success." •

Being a first-generation Haitian-American, Keily's parents instilled the values of community, education and faith. In pursuit of the American dream, her parents faced many challenges.

"With the desire to live a better life. my father has now built a career in information technology (IT), and my mother serves as a registered nurse," she explains. "In addition, my parents have led a pastoral ministry in the heart of South Florida for the past 23 years. Exemplifying the values they've taught me."

The 10-year plan

Very ambitious, Keily knew her life plan even before high school. "I had a 10-year plan," explains Keily. "The summer before starting high school, I wrote out my goals. 'I want to get into dental school!' I researched the exams I would need to take, the undergraduate major, and the costs - and I was ready to get started."

With the various dental school prerequisites in mind, Keily says she chose a degree in biology. "I began my college education at a local community college and later transferred to Florida Atlantic University (FAU) in Boca Raton. Because of my preparation, I graduated debt-free! I utilized financial aid, grants and scholarships to pay for my education."

Preparing for dental school

In 2019, Keily took a gap year and worked as a dental assistant. She applied to dental school twice, "During my first application, I submitted my materials late in the cycle, which I knew would decrease my chances," she explains.

"During a Zoom event with the Predental Club at FAU, Brian Trecek shared that half of the students admitted come from out of state, which made me more hopeful that I could get in," she admits. "I applied to six other schools, and was accepted into three."

Why Marquette? "Marquette was the first school that accepted me," she shares. "I paid to hold my spot, so that was it."

The interview experience

She recalls, minutes before her interview with Marquette, Keily's internet disconnected randomly. "My heart was racing, but it came back on with seconds to spare! I was so nervous and anxious, that I immediately ran toward my parents. And I asked if they would pray with me. Sure enough, that prayer worked. My interview went well!"

During the interview, Keily recalls one particular question. She was asked about her hopes and aspirations as a dentist and if anything would deter her from pursuing this career.

She replied, "I was assisting with a full-mouth extraction, and during the procedure, the patient stated that he was not feeling well. Seconds later, he started throwing up everywhere." What would be a vulnerable and embarrassing moment for anyone became a moment that Keily would later describe as unforgettable.



"That experience taught me the values I should embrace as a future healthcare provider," she says. "Empathy and compassion are some of the greatest skills anyone can possess, which has set the tone for how I care for my patients here at school."

Keily stated during her interview that nothing could deter her at this point. "My interviewers laughed, and most importantly the patient got the care and comfort he needed."

Last week, it was Keily on the other side of the Zoom call when she listened to 10 prospective students and heard their stories.

Looking toward her impactful career ahead

"At first, it took me a while to adjust to the social life, the weather and the academic rigor," she admits. "However, I found my support system, and today I tutor and offer advice to other students. There will be bad days along the way, but keep pushing forward with your future in mind."

As she begins her job search, she's seeking a mentorship opportunity. "I'd like to work in a Federally Qualified Health Clinic (FQHC) to help underserved areas. But I'm also exploring other options."

Even during the toughest days in dental school, seeing people get the dental care they need motivates Keily. "I know I made the right decision. I know I'm making a difference now and will in the future." •

r. Tom Reid's journey to becoming the newest President of the Wisconsin Dental Association (WDA) began at Marquette University School of Dentistry, where he learned the importance of community engagement. "Giving back is one of the most important parts of being a MUSoD graduate," he says. "We're all committed to being the difference."

With more than 20 years of dental experience at East Grove Dental in Madison, Wisconsin, Dr. Reid has built a reputation as a skilled family dentist and a leader who values relationships and patient-centered care. His commitment to dentistry goes beyond the chair. He works as a strong advocate for the profession, pushing for advancements that benefit both practitioners and patients across the state. Now, as he steps into his year-long tenure as WDA President, Dr. Reid will lead Wisconsin's dental community into a future filled with innovation, unity and an unwavering focus on elevating the standard of care.

MUSoD: A great decision

A native of Decatur, Illinois, Dr. Reid chose MUSoD for its challenging curriculum emphasizing both didactic learning and hands-on training. He says his experience at MUSoD was "tough but worth it," helping him navigate real-life difficulties such as the death of his dental partner in 2010 and the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Going to Marquette is one of the best choices I ever made," he says. "Marquette graduates are high-quality dentists, and the success of its alumni speaks for itself."

After graduation in 1999, Dr. Reid became a partner at East Grove Dental in Madison, where he found a practice culture aligned with his values. Over the years, he's formed close relationships with patients, some spanning multiple generations in the same family. "We treat oral health in a down-to-earth way, where patients are like family," he explains. "People appreciate being treated like they matter."

In his personal life, Dr. Reid has five children with his husband of 14 years, Rolando Cruz, who works alongside him at the front desk of East Grove Dental. Their oldest child plans to retrace Dr. Reid's path to Milwaukee, where she's hoping to enroll in Marquette University Law School for the fall 2025 semester. Together, the family enjoys an active life, and Dr. Reid has competed in several Ironman Triathlons, marathons and ultra-distance events.

A commitment to leadership

As WDA President, Dr. Reid plans to focus on key issues affecting dentists statewide, such as workforce shortages and reduced compensation from dental benefit companies. He also wants to build a stronger association that delivers value to Wisconsin's dental community. "We need to do right by the WDA to support our profession, patients, families and communities," he says. "By supporting the WDA, we're building better communities in Wisconsin."

His vision for the WDA includes unifying the 3,000-plus dentists in Wisconsin under one banner. "As dentists, one of the best things we can do is join the WDA to support one another and our patients," he explains. "By unifying together, we can bring dentistry back to being one of the most trusted professions."

He plans to expand on current successes, such as WDA's \$20 million grant to invest in hygiene programs at Wisconsin's technical colleges. And he's eager to reinforce the strong partnership between the WDA and MUSoD, fostering innovative teaching methods and practice strategies that benefit students, dentists and patients.

"We're fortunate to have such a great relationship with the dental school," he concludes. "Dean Kalenderian is doing marvelous things and we're excited to continue being part of that process. We want to make necessary and beneficial changes to our profession, which is what being an MUSoD graduate is all about. Marquette makes differencemakers." •

NEW MAJOR RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL GRANTS

ARE AN INVESTMENT IN THE FUTURE OF DENTISTRY

linical decision-making in dentistry hinges on a continuous process of evidence-based practice, informed by both clinical outcomes research and discoveries in basic science. As the dental profession evolves, there's a growing need to expand and validate our current and future knowledge base.

The Marquette University School of Dentistry plays a pivotal role in shaping this knowledge, influencing how our students and professionals practice dentistry now and in the future. As one of the four key pillars of our strategic plan, research is integral to MUSoD's mission and central to our five-year strategic plan. Our growing slate of research projects reflects the dedication of our faculty to contribute to the university's research mission and goals, and the broader field of evidence-based dental medicine.

"At MUSoD, we're at the cutting edge and the forefront of discovering the knowledge that will inform how dentistry is practiced in the future," says Dr. Jeffrey Toth, PhD, BS Eng., Associate Dean for Research and Professor of Biomaterials at MUSoD, and director and principal investigator of OREC's Biomaterial & Histology Laboratory (BIMA). "Our dental school is known for research, so discovering new information and then disseminating that information is an important

focus for not only the dental school, but also for Marquette University."

\$7.3 million in new research grants

MUSoD's faculty are committed to enhancing our research initiatives, which represent a vital investment in the future of dentistry. This year alone, the school received three new major grant awards – two from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and one from the Department of Education (DOE), totaling \$7.3 million. These large competitive grants reflect the dental school and university's commitment to expanding our dental school and the university's research mission.

One R01 grant from the NIH's National Institute on Aging awarded \$2.38 million to Dr. Toth and his co-principal investigator, Dr. Carol Everson, professor of medicine at the Medical College of Wisconsin, to examine the link between bone loss and chronic sleep restriction. This research aims to shed new light on this complex relationship, offering valuable insights into the cellular consequences of sleep restriction and risk of disease, including its impact on bone health.

This research has significant implications for dental health, as bone healing is essential after common oral procedures and surgeries, such as tooth extractions and dental implants. "Bone healing after a dental procedure may be affected by sleep restriction, making this an important topic for us at the dental school to investigate," says Dr. Toth.

A second UH3 grant awarded more than \$3.5 million in funds from the NIH and National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR) to Dr. Christopher Okunseri, MUSoD professor and director of the predoctoral program for dental public health. This project continues a longstanding research focus of the school in the areas of dental public health and access to care, representing another step forward in breaking down the barriers to dental care.

"Appointment no-shows are a common occurrence in dental offices," says Dr. Okunseri. "Rather than blaming patients for failing to show up, we believe dental clinics can take the lead to reduce no-shows with a systematic approach. With this project, we will test an organizational change model that is shown to reduce missed appointments in medical settings but remains untried in dentistry."

Dr. Okunseri and his research partner are piloting an evidence-based organizational change model that works to

integrate effective practices such as regular calls and texts to patients regarding appointment times, shorter and more convenient appointment times, and using motivational conversations to encourage patients to prioritize their oral health.

A third \$1.37 million grant from the DOE was awarded to principal investigator Dr. Elisabeta Karl, DDS, MS, PhD, Associate Professor and Associate Dean of Academic Affairs at MUSoD. The grant will fund the creation of a consortium institution consisting of faculty member content experts in collaboration with instructional designers to make open educational resources (OER) available to dental students. OER are free, openly licensed materials that can be used for learning and research. The founding members of the consortium have identified at least six books that will be the first targeted products of the grant.

The initial goal is that each dental education organization within the consortium will convert at least 25% of its curriculum to OER within the three-year grant period. "We anticipate that student performance, engagement and use of OER will increase, ultimately resulting in improved student learning," says Dr. Karl. "This would also create about a \$500,000 total cost savings across the targeted degree programs during the grant period."

Three main research themes

These three grants align with the strategic priorities of Elsbeth Kalenderian, DDS, MPH, PhD, Dean of MUSoD. "Dean Kalenderian is very supportive of the research mission, both of Marquette University and the dental school," says Dr. Toth. "Her expertise in public health, patient safety and quality improvement are all areas that we intend to grow in the future with her expertise."

All grants fall within one of MUSoD's three distinct fields of research. "Our biggest strengths lie in these areas, so we've pursued grants that continue building on these strengths," says Dr. Toth.

- Clinical Oral Healthcare and Outcomes Research.
- MUoSD recognizes that evidence-based dentistry resulting from high-quality clinical oral health care outcomes research informs dental clinical decision-making. The continuous process of evidence-based dentistry driven by clinical outcomes research unites with our evidence-based clinical teaching.
- Biomaterials and Tissue Engineering. It's estimated that 50%-75% of a dentist's time is spent with the biomaterials that they use for patient care. Biomaterials research at MU-SoD has focused on characterization of material properties, fabrication of new biomaterials, characterization of the host response to biomaterials (biocompatibility), and improving adhesion to tooth structure by modification of adhesive resins. Many of our clinical graduate programs also perform research on dental biomaterials used in endodontics, orthodontics, prosthodontics and periodontics. MUSoD has tissue engineering research that seeks to repair hard- and

soft-tissue deficits using biomaterial scaffolds combined with cells or therapeutic agents. We also have expertise in regenerative dental medicine and dental medical devices.

Dental Public Health, Epidemiology, and Access to
Care (Healthcare Disparities). This is one of our most
well-established research areas. Our faculty have expertise
in investigating epidemiology of oral diseases and dental
health care services research, including evidence-based
dental outcomes research, oral health prevention, health
promotion, biostatistics, and data science in dentistry and
public health. This focus is consistent with the university's
mission of service to others.

A competitive advantage

Research not only helps attract top-tier students, it supports them by offering unique opportunities to participate in the leading edge of dental research. Dr. Toth estimates that more than 10% of students are active in research during their four years at the school, and he expects that number to increase as the school receives more – and bigger – grants.

A strong research program also appeals to faculty, bringing in curious minds who are asking the most important questions in dentistry and medicine. "The strength of our research program is our faculty," he says. "Our students know it, and our alumni know they had good faculty while they were here. It's my pleasure to work with our faculty every day." The school's upgraded facilities, such as the Delta Dental Research Laboratory, a nearly 4,700-square-foot lab dedicated to research, have had a significant impact on the school's ability to attract research funding. Dr. Toth's grant application was rated in the top 5% of applicants, indicating the high quality of the university's research facilities and capabilities. "The fact that Marquette made an investment in research facilities allows us to compete at a new level," says Dr. Toth. "That's a big difference we didn't have before."

Dr. Toth also credits alumni support as a critical first step in establishing the school as a destination for high-quality research projects. "Before you can have sustainability through continuous funding, you need an initial investment – and that initial investment was made in part by industry partners, the university and our amazing alumni," he concludes. •



Faculty Members Inducted as Fellows





Since we last printed *Dental Images,* we have lost a number of our MUSoD family including full-time and long-standing part-time faculty. We remember them and their impact on Marquette Dental School and its graduates. We're grateful they shared their time and talents with so many MUSoD students over the years.



The Marquette University community this year has grieved the loss of Dr. Michael R. Lovell, who passed away June 9, 2024, while in Rome with his wife, Amy, members of the Society of Jesus and the Board of Trustees on a Jesuit formation pilgrimage. For the past three years, Dr. Lovell had been battling sarcoma, a rare form of cancer.

Dr. Lovell was the 24th president in Marquette's 143-year history and the first lay person to lead the university. The theme of his September 19, 2014, inauguration – "Ignited in Faith. Alive in Inquiry. Forward in Service." – reflected

the true hallmarks of how Dr. Lovell engaged with others, explored new ideas, determined priorities and collaborated across the university and wider community to create growth and improvements that would benefit as many lives as possible.

Dr. Lovell's decade of leadership at Marquette was marked by a deep commitment to innovation, entrepreneurship, and community renewal and development – consistent with the university's Catholic, Jesuit mission that animated him. Aligned with those values, Dr. Lovell had great fondness for the School of Dentistry, and he was a champion for the research, innovation, student activities and community-focused mission at the dental school.

Dr. Lovell truly loved Marquette, and Marquette loved him back.
